Away again for Round 8 against Seatoun at Seatoun Park. These games are always competitive as both sides like to play a similar brand of football. We were without Grego whom was out of the country on behalf of NZ Football, and so it was Becky Stewart whom took it upon herself to create something out of nothing and put an all-important winner in the back of the net. This game saw Caelin Patterson play her first 90mins for the W League in an impressive debut. 1-0 was enough to see the game out.

Round 9 was a night game against Wairarapa in Masterton, the 5:30pm kickoff making it feel like a training night. We definitely knew it was winter as it was 4 degrees at kickoff! Wairarapa are structurally a strong side, and despite us having the most of the ball, our finishing wasn't quite up to par, and we went into the half confident, but only 1-0 up.

The second half was a different story, we hit the underside of the crossbar inside a minute, and then a further minute later Grego scored her second of the game. Past experience drives Anton . . .

Fond memories of previous campaigns are driving Elizabeth Anton as she prepares to suit up for a second U-20 cycle.

Anton was recently named in Gareth Turnbull's 20-strong New Zealand squad for the upcoming OFC U-19 Women's Championship having previously starred for her country during the 2016 FIFA U-20 World Cup campaign, as well as at U-17 FIFA World Cup campaign in 2014.



"It's always exciting hearing that you will be able to represent your country," she says.

"My previous age-group experiences have all been really enjoyable so I can't wait."

Anton played every minute of the 2016 campaign and the centre back can take a lot from that experience into the July qualifiers as New Zealand aims to earn a spot in France 2018.

"I think the main thing I learned was to play with confidence when playing international matches. It's important to believe in yourself, not to hide on the world stage and to just give it all you've got."

The Western Springs defender – along with several other members of the squad – is involved in the Football Ferns Development Programme and Anton says the the environment is second to none.

"We're training four times a week with the top New Zealand-based footballers, along with a match against U-17 boy's sides – it has really helped me to identify and work on my weaknesses and strengths," she says.

Past experience drives Anton . . .

“It’s great being in a competitive environment with team mates who have similar goals and aspirations as you do, I find this helps me to be more motivated to become a better player.”

Anton has her sights firmly set on reaching the pinnacle of the international game but has a job to take care of with the U-20s first.



“Winning is the main goal and qualifying for France 2018,” she says.

“My goals for after the OFC U-19 Championship is to make the U-20 World Cup squad if we qualify and, in the long-term, I want to make the Football Ferns.”

Heartbreak in Russia . . .

All Whites coach Anthony Hudson called for a performance for New Zealand to be proud of and his boys delivered with an incredible effort only to fall to a 2-1 defeat to Mexico in the FIFA Confederations Cup at Sochi this morning.

The All Whites deserved their half-time lead after an outstanding finish for the opening goal by Chris Wood from a Clayton Lewis ball a few minutes before half-time. Mexico rallied in the second half and Raul Jimenez levelled the score in the 54th minute when finding the top corner at the end of a free-flowing move.

New Zealand hearts were then broken though as Oribe Peralta smashed home a cut back off the inside of the near post to put Mexico in front in the 72nd minute. They could, and probably should, have made it three when Juergen Damm weaved his way into the box and did everything but score.

The All Whites had their chances to get something out of the game in the dying stages and threw everything at the side ranked 17th in the world but were denied a hugely memorable result as Mexico successfully closed out the win.



Congratulations Bria – turning 200 . . .

Bria Sargent recently hit the milestone very few players achieve. 200 games for a club's 1st team

Bria first joined the club in 2003, playing for two seasons. After a brief stint with Seatoun, Bria rejoined Upper Hutt in 2006 convincing Wendi and Gibby to play "socially" as well. The club won the league that year and was promoted to the top grade again! So much for it being social and Bria has been at Upper Hutt ever since!
